# Protestant Churchgoers' Views on Church Participation during COVID-19

A SURVEY OF 1,000 AMERICAN PROTESANT CHURCHGOERS


### Methodology

- The online survey of 1,000 American Protestant churchgoers was conducted February 5-18, 2021 using a national, pre-recruited panel
- Respondents were screened to include those who identified as Protestant/non-denominational and attended religious services at least once a month in 2019
- Quotas and slight weights were used to balance gender, age, region, ethnicity, and education to more accurately reflect the population
- The completed sample is 1,000 surveys
- The sample provides 95% confidence that the sampling error from the panel does not exceed <u>+</u>3.2% This margin of error accounts for the effect of weight
- Margins of error are higher in sub-groups
- Comparisons are made to a Lifeway Research survey of Protestant churchgoers September 20-27, 2019 using the same methodology

### **Definitions**


- Evangelical Beliefs are defined using the NAE Lifeway Research Evangelical Beliefs Research Definition based on respondent beliefs
- Respondents are asked their level of agreement with four separate statements using a four-point, forced choice scale (strongly agree, somewhat agree, somewhat disagree, strongly disagree).
   Those who strongly agree with all four statements are categorized as having Evangelical Beliefs
  - The Bible is the highest authority for what I believe
  - It is very important for me personally to encourage non-Christians to trust Jesus Christ as their Savior
  - Jesus Christ's death on the cross is the only sacrifice that could remove the penalty of my sin
  - Only those who trust in Jesus Christ alone as their Savior receive God's free gift of eternal salvation

### 22% say their church has not resumed in-person worship services















# "In what format(s) did your church offer live, online worship services?"


Among those whose church offered live streamed worship services








# 86% are proud of how their church has responded during the COVID-19 pandemic

### Significant Statistical Differences

Comparisons were made to determine if there are any significant statistical differences among worship service attendance, denomination, and evangelical beliefs.

## "Since the outbreak of COVID-19, which of the following best describes the in-person worship services your church has offered?"

- Those age 50-64 (35%) are more likely to select "In-person services stopped for a short-period of time and then resumed" than those 18-29 (26%)
- Whites (38%) are more likely to select "In-person services stopped for a short-period of time and then resumed" than African Americans (13%) and Hispanics (23%)
- African Americans are the most likely to select "In-person services stopped many months ago and have not resumed" (40%)
- Those in the Midwest (36%) are more likely to select "In-person services stopped for a short-period of time and then resumed" than those in the Northeast (22%) and West (26%)
- Those in the Northeast (29%) are more likely to select "In-person services stopped many months ago and have not resumed" than those in the Midwest (16%) and South (19%)

# "Since the outbreak of COVID-19, which of the following best describes the in-person worship services your church has offered?" (continued)

- Those with a Bachelor's Degree (27%) or a Graduate Degree (26%) are more likely to select "In-person services stopped many months ago and have not resumed" than those who are High School Graduates or less (17%)
- Those that attended a worship service 4 or more times in January 2020 are the most likely to select "In-person services stopped for a short-period of time and then resumed" (36%)
- Methodists (23%) and non-denominational (21%) are more likely to select "In-person services have stopped and started more than once" than Lutherans (11%)
- Methodists are the least likely to select "In-person services stopped for a short-period of time and then resumed" (16%)
- Non-denominational are the least likely to select "In-person services stopped many months ago and have not resumed" (10%)
- Those with evangelical beliefs are more likely to select "In-person services stopped for a short-period of time and then resumed" than those without evangelical beliefs (39% v. 23%)

# "Since the outbreak of COVID-19, has your church offered and have you used any of the following? Drive in worship services (where people stay in their cars)"

- Those age 18-29 (26%) are more likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" than those 50-64 (14%) and 65+ (10%)
- African Americans (25%) and Hispanics (23%) are more likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" than Whites (14%)
- Those in the Northeast (69%) and Midwest (66%) are more likely to select "My church did not offer" than those in the South (58%)
- Those with some college (68%) are more likely to select "My church did not offer" than those who are High School Graduates or less (59%)
- Those that attended a worship service 4 or more times in January 2020 are the most likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" (20%)
- Methodists (70%) are more likely to select "My church did not offer" than Baptists (58%)
- Those with evangelical beliefs are more likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" than those without evangelical beliefs (20% v. 14%)

### "Since the outbreak of COVID-19, has your church offered and have you used any of the following? Outdoor worship services"

- Those age 50-64 (59%) and 65+ (65%) are more likely to select "My church did not offer" than those 18-29 (37%) and 30-49 (51%)
- Whites (57%) are more likely to select "My church did not offer" than African Americans (46%)
- Those in the Midwest (61%) are more likely to select "My church did not offer" than those in the South (52%) and West (49%)
- Those with a Bachelor's degree (30%) are more likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" than those with some college (19%)
- Those that attended a worship service 4 or more times in January 2020 are the most likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" (28%)
- Lutherans (61%) are more likely to select "My church did not offer" than non-denominational (46%)
- Those with evangelical beliefs are more likely to select "My church offered and I participated" than those without evangelical beliefs (26% v. 20%)

## "Since the outbreak of COVID-19, has your church offered and have you used any of the following? Live streamed worship services"

- Males are more likely to select "My church offered, and I did not participate" than Females (17% v. 12%)
- Those age 65+ (17%) are more likely to select "My church did not offer" than those 18-29 (8%)
- Hispanics (81%) are more likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" than Whites (69%) and African Americans (70%)
- Those in the South (74%) are more likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" than those in the Midwest (65%)
- Those with a Bachelor's Degree are the most likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" (80%)
- Those that attended a worship service 4 or more times in January 2020 are the most likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" (75%)

# "Since the outbreak of COVID-19, has your church offered and have you used any of the following? Live streamed worship services" (continued)

- Lutherans (25%) are more likely to select "My church offered, and I did not participate" than Baptists (13%)
- Those with evangelical beliefs are more likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" than those without evangelical beliefs (76% v. 64%)

# "Since the outbreak of COVID-19, has your church offered and have you used any of the following? Posted videos of worship services that could be watched any time"

- Those that attended a worship service 4 or more times in January 2020 are the most likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" (66%)
- Those with evangelical beliefs are more likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" than those without evangelical beliefs (64% v. 58%)

## "Since the outbreak of COVID-19, has your church offered and have you used any of the following? Online Bible studies for adults"

- Those age 18-29 (40%) and 30-49 (36%) are more likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" than those 50-64 (27%) and 65+ (19%)
- African Americans (42%) and Hispanics (46%) are more likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" than Whites (25%)
- Those in the South (33%) and West (34%) are more likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" than those in the Midwest (23%)
- Those who are High School Graduates or less are the most likely to select "My church did not offer" (37%)
- Those that attended a worship service 4 or more times in January 2020 are the most likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" (36%)

# "Since the outbreak of COVID-19, has your church offered and have you used any of the following? Online Bible studies for adults" (continued)

- Baptists (33%) and non-denominational (33%) are more likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" than Lutherans (17%) and Methodists (19%)
- Those with evangelical beliefs are more likely to select "My church offered, and I participated" than those without evangelical beliefs (36% v. 25%)

#### Video streamed on church website

• Those with a Bachelor's Degree (68%) are more likely to select than those who are High School Graduates or less (53%) or with some college (50%)

#### **Facebook Live**

- Females are more likely to select than Males (56% v. 45%)
- Those age 18-29 (59%) are more likely to select than those 65+ (47%)
- African Americans are the most likely to select (66%)
- Those in the South (58%) are more likely to select than those in the Midwest (47%) and West (40%)
- Those that attended a worship service 0-1 times in January 2020 are the least likely to select (35%)
- Baptists (58%) are the most likely to select

#### Video conference (e.g., Zoom)

- Those age 18-29 are the most likely to select (37%)
- African Americans (36%) and Hispanics (29%) are more likely to select than Whites (17%)
- Those in the Northeast (30%) and South (24%) are more likely to select than those in the Midwest (16%)
- Those with a Bachelor's degree (31%) and a Graduate degree (27%) are more likely to select than those who are High School Graduates or less (17%)

#### YouTube

- Those age 18-29 are the most likely to select (46%)
- African Americans (40%) and Hispanics (43%) are more likely to select than Whites (31%)
- Those in the West (42%) are more likely to select than those in the South (32%)
- Those with a Bachelor's Degree (41%) are more likely to select than those who are High School Graduates or less (29%)

#### Online worship service at my church

- Those age 18-29 (60%) are more likely to select than those 65+ (47%)
- African Americans (59%) and Hispanics (64%) are more likely to select than Whites (50%)
- Those in the South (57%) are more likely to select than those in the Midwest (49%)
- Those with a Bachelor's Degree (60%) are more likely to select than those who are High School Graduates or less (49%)
- Those that attended a worship service 4 or more times in January 2020 (58%) are more likely to select than those that attended 2-3 times in January 2020 (46%)

#### Online worship service at another church

- Females are more likely to select than Males (19% v. 13%)
- Those age 18-29 are the most likely to select (25%)
- African Americans (27%) are more likely to select than Whites (13%)
- Those with a Bachelor's Degree (22%) are more likely to select than those who are High School Graduates or less (13%)
- Baptists (20%) and non-denominational (17%) are more likely to select than Methodists (5%)

#### Worship service on TV

- Those age 18-29 (33%) are more likely to select than those 50-64 (21%) and 65+ (22%)
- African Americans (38%) are more likely to select than Whites (21%) and Hispanics (19%)
- Those in the South (30%) are more likely to select than those in the Northeast (15%) and Midwest (20%)
- Those with a Bachelor's Degree (31%) are more likely to select than those who are High School Graduates or less (21%)
- Lutherans are the least likely to select (11%)

#### Worship service by radio

- Those age 18-29 are the most likely to select (22%)
- African Americans (16%) are more likely to select than Whites (7%) and Hispanics (6%)
- Those that attended a worship service 0-1 times in January 2020 are the least likely to select (3%)
- Baptists (11%) and non-denominational (11%) are more likely to select than Methodists (3%)

### "I am proud of how my church has responded during the COVID-19 pandemic."

- Whites (10%) are more likely to Disagree than African Americans (5%)
- Those in the South (88%) are more likely to Agree than those in the Midwest (82%)
- Those that attended a worship service 4 or more times in January 2020 (88%) are more likely to Agree than those that attended 0-1 times in January 2020 (79%)
- Those with evangelical beliefs are more likely to Agree than those without evangelical beliefs (88% v. 84%)

### "I am ashamed of how my church has responded during the COVID-19 pandemic."

- Those age 18-29 are the most likely to Agree (26%)
- African Americans (19%) and Hispanics (16%) are more likely to Agree than Whites (8%)
- Those in the South (14%) are more likely to Agree than those in the Midwest (8%)
- Baptists (12%) and non-denominational (13%) are more likely to Agree than Lutherans (5%)
- Those with evangelical beliefs are more likely to Disagree than those without evangelical beliefs (87% v. 81%)
